Van DeVenter, a well-meaning but "unesthetic" woman who favors gourds in table arrangements; Mrs. John A. Tweedy, a champion of 'erbs and traditional pronunciation, who sticks by her guns even when it means clashing with those who would modernize such institutions as the vulgar common onion; and Mrs. A. R. Fiorelli, a member none-too-long on brains, but with more wisdom than first meets the eye.

A floating touched among all the verbal effluvia serenely intent on putting in only a port of beauty ("with a great big capital B") is the elegant, refined, and unbelievable Mrs. Van Dyne, to be portrayed with a flourish by Mrs. B. W. Roberts.

Mrs. W. C. Boswell is producer of the show, aided by Mrs. Park Montague and Mrs. Louis Dyer. Mrs. Boswell's brother, Jack Hudson, has acted as director by special arrangement with the Community Aid division of AC-CENTRE Theatre!
