IHS Tops Tartar Spikers

Dennis Hester, Al Rainwater, Gary Cooke and Ron Heffler supplied the punch Wednesday in the Tartar-Inglewood track meet, but the Torrance preppers couldn't knock off the Sentinels as they were beaten, 58-46, at Inglewood.

The Tartarbees also lost, 52 1/2-42 1/2, but the Torrance C team won, 37-26.

Hester bettered his season's best in two events, duplicating his feat of last week against Leuzinger.

He edged Al Herzog of the Sentinels in the half mile run, breaking the tape in 2:00.5. The limber Tartar then skipped over the high jump bar at 6' 2 1/2", to better his previous mark of 6' 2", set last week.

Rainwater Wins 100
Rainwater took the century dash in a good 10.1 time, while Cooke took the 220 in 22.5, somewhat under his school record time of 21.9. Cooke took second in the 100-yard dash, while Rainwater ran second in the 150-yard low hurdle race.

Heffler, Jim Powers and Hester swept the broad jump event for the Tartar Varsity. Ron won the event with a leap of 20' 5". Powers took second and Hester came in third.

In Class B competition, Gary Brimley of Torrance ran a sterling, 3:32.1 race in the 1320, but was edged at the finish by Inglewood's Miller. Both runners were given the same time.


Good Marks
Other top B marks were Bill Meacham's 1:31.9 timing in the winning the 860-yard run; Mikey Bosovich's 10.6 time for the 100-yard dash; and John Roccoforte's best of 45' 11" in taking the shot put.

Jim McDougal broad jumped 18' and George Boscon toured the century in 10.6 to lead over Tartarcoos to their triumph over the Sentinels.

Willard Morgan and Don Porter, Tartar track mentors, will next enter their three squads in the Inglewood Relays, slated April 14-15 in Inglewood's Sentinel Stadium.

Thirteen schools, from the Bay and Pioneer Leagues, will be entered in the two-day track meet.

TRACK MARKS BETTERED IN 18 OF 28 EVENTS

Tartar tracksters have been improving their own individual marks as the present season has been progressing, according to word from Coaches Willard Morgan and Don Porter.

Tartars have bettered top team marks in 18 of 28 total events for Varsity, Class B and Class C competition, according to best efforts released last week by the coaches.

Best improvement has been shown by Dennis Hester, the Varsity "iron man." Hester has raised his best effort in the high jump from 5' 9" to 6' 2 1/2" in only two weeks. He also has cut his time in the 880-yard run from 2:07.7 to 2:00.5 in the same amount of time.

Paramount, Tartars Go 10 Innings In Tightly-Played League Contest

Paramount defeated the Torrance Tartars, 5-4, Thursday in a 10-inning Bay League marathon at South Gate, and, in doing so, dropped the locals from the ranks of the loop's unbeaten squads.

The Pirates came up with a run in the bottom half of the tenth frame to end the contest, which was touch and go from the start.

Neither team committed an error in the tightly-played contest. Torrance took a one-run lead when they counted in their half of the second inning.

The Tartars came right back to count twice in the fourth to take a 3-0 lead. It was short-lived however, as the winners began whittling at the lead. Paramount tallied solo runs in the fourth and fifth frames.

Gary Hakanson, pinch batting for right fielder Chuck Todd, sent the Tartars into a 4-2 lead in the top half of the sixth inning. Hakanson stroled to the dish and rapped out a long triple to chase home Butch Tiernan, Torrance catcher, who had singled. That was the last score for the Tartars.

Two runs in the bottom half of the sixth inning for Paramount squared things at 4-4 and there the score stayed for three more innings. Hakanson, who went to mound after pinch hitting for Todd, held the Pirates hitless and runless until the tenth when the roof fell in.

Jenkins and Sisler, who nurlled for the winners, doled out the same no-hit, no-run menu to Torrance, but held on for an inning longer to preserve the win.

Jenkins, who went nine frames on the mound, picked up the win. It was the Tartars' final time at the plate when Sisler relieved. He set the locals down in order to halt the long game.

Third sacker Skakelford opened the Pirates' tenth inning by singling to center. He stole second base and after two were out, sped home on another single by left fielder Holbenseifer.

Del Nuzum's Tartars rest this week. They return to Bay League action April 12, when they travel to Redondo for their fourth loop game of the season.
