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

Tradition Dominates at Eipper Home

Another old custom which the Eippers carry out at this time is the quaint practice of presenting the "Fox nest" to the children in addition to colored eggs. A box in the shape of a house is filled with fancy cookies and placed in a prominent place where the youngsters of the party can help themselves to the goodies. This is an old custom dating back to the parents of Mr. Eipper who were natives of Germany. It was thought to be of German origin but the Eippers have since learned that this practice reportedly began in China many years ago.
