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HAMBURGER CHEESE CUSTARD
Yield: 6 servings
1 pound hamburger
1 tablespoon salt
4 eggs, beaten slightly
1 teaspoon dry mustard
Few grains garlic salt
Spread hamburger mixed with salt in an 8x8x2 inch baking pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) 15 minutes. Mix eggs, mustard, garlic, and flour. Pour over hot meat. Sprinkle cheese over all. Arrange buttered toast cubes on top. Continue baking 30 minutes or until cheese custard is set. Cut into squares. Serve hot.
