Torrance Democrats are well represented on the panel of committeemen of the 17th Congressional District Democratic council which held its first meeting in Gardena, Sunday.

Councilman Hails Signal Work at Park

Appreciation for the progress being made in remodeling the Redondo Beach boulevard entrance to Alondra Park to allow for the installation of traffic signals at Redondo Beach and Yukon avenues was expressed this week by Torrance Councilman Nick Draie to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

"I have been watching the wonderful progress being made by the county road crews in readying the intersection of Yukon and Redondo Beach boulevard at the entrance to Alondra Park for the installation of traffic signals," Councilman Draie declared.

"I am sure that if they could, all the families in that particular area would send their sincere thanks from their hearts for this support in the behalf of safety for their children," he concluded.

Supervisor Hahn said that the remodeling of the Park entrance has now been completed and that work has begun on installing the signals which will allow traffic to enter the park directly from Yukon.

Push button signals controls will be installed for the benefit of pedestrians, and especially the thousands of children who will use Alondra Park during the spring and summer months. Signals should be installed, tested, and in operation within two weeks, Hahn said.
