

# LEASE FOR AIRPORT SHOPPING CENTER GETS COUNCIL APPROVAL

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NEW SHOPPING CENTER REVEALED . . . Plans for the 600,000 square foot shopping center designed for Store Properties, Inc., for construction at Crenshaw Blvd. and Pacific Coast Hwy. were disclosed this week by the

planning, architectural, and engineering firm of Pereira & Luckman. The plans have been in the development stage for nearly a year and will cost between \$6 million and \$8 million.

## Construction of Center To Be Completed in 1956

Plans for commercial development of the 35-acre Airport triangle at Crenshaw Blvd. and Pacific Coast Hwy. were revealed here yesterday following approval of a 50-year lease with Store Properties, Inc., by the City Council Tuesday evening.

Announcing plans for development of the multi-million dollar center was Samuel Genis, president of Store Properties, Inc. He said the lease was obtained by Store Properties after city officials had determined that the highest possible use to which the property could be put would be a major retail business development.

The triangle leased this week to Store Properties was separated from Torrance Municipal Airport two years ago when Crenshaw Blvd. was opened to Pacific Coast Hwy.

The new shopping center occupies a site which will enable it to serve the entire peninsula area and is in the center of a population exceeding 350,000 persons, Genis said.

Approval of the lease by the City Council was done by resolution presented to that body by City Attorney James M. Hall, who has handled details of the lease negotiation with the development firm for the city.

### Designer Well Known

In making the announcement, Genis said the well known planning and architectural firm of Pereira & Luckman had been commissioned to design the 600,000 square foot shopping center which will be one of the most outstanding retail developments of its kind in Southern California.

Panorama Markets Co., one of the Southland's leading retail grocery firms, has leased 61,000 square feet in the center through Coldwell, Banker & Co., pioneers of the shopping center field who have been retained as exclusive management and leasing agents for the property.

Other top Southland firms now negotiating for space in the new center include Butler Brothers Co., which has made application for 150,000 square feet for a department store. Negotiations also are under way with another leading department store for a major lease, Genis reported.

### Others Negotiating

Also negotiating leases in the new Torrance center are F. W. Woolworth Co., Lerner's Dress Shops, W. T. Grant Co., Bank of America, C. H. Baker Shoe Co., Edison Shoe Co., and Bond's Men's Clothing. Other nationally known firms also have expressed keen interest in the center, Genis said.

As designed by Pereira & Luckman, the buildings will be surrounded by parking areas which will accommodate in excess of 4000 cars. Ample additional space is provided for employee parking. All pedestrian circulation has been planned around two intersecting malls sufficient in width to incorporate small outdoor displays and a series of small supervised nurseries for children. Connected overhead bridge canopies provide maximum customer protection from the elements.

### Features Listed

The buildings will incorporate the use of Palos Verdes stone and will feature gay carnival type sign treatments. A unique feature has been designed for the development in the use of colorful kiosks positioned advantageously within the parking areas around the periphery of the center. Abundantly landscaped rest areas are placed in the malls and extensive lighting is provided for maximum use of visual merchandising.

Present plans call for construction to commence in the spring of 1956 with completion scheduled in the fall.

Harold Johnson is associate architect with Pereira & Luckman for the project.

Store Properties, Inc., is in the course of completing a huge development of the same type at the intersection of Laurel Canyon Blvd. and Victory Blvd. in the Valley. The organization specializes in retail shopping developments for major chain stores.

## Clay Digging Plans Hit by School Board

A letter has been sent to the Torrance City Council from the Board of Education protesting the controversial north Torrance clay pit, which adjoins the proposed Arlington School.

The pit, near 178th St. and the Edison Co. right-of-way, "will create a definite safety hazard and attractive nuisance for the several hundred children who will be attending the Arlington School," the letter said.

"There are many undesirable odors and dust problems in connection with property in the vicinity of a dump, which are not conducive to a good education environment for the children of the area."

H. M. Guenser, who has used part of the area to dig clay for his brick-making factory, has sought to expand his operations to an L-shaped area. After he has completed his digging, he proposes to give the land to the city for a park.

In the meantime, however, the area would be filled in for a dump to replace the clay which has been removed.

## Teachers, Staff For School Year Hired by Board

Administrators and teachers for the Torrance Unified School District were rehired by the School Board at its meeting Tuesday night.

The list included officials ranging from superintendent J. H. Hull, 31 school administrators, 17 auxiliary personnel, 432 teachers, and 168 bus drivers and maintenance men.

## Polio Shots to Resume Monday

Polio shots in Torrance will be resumed again Monday, according to the latest word from the County Health Department, Dr. Benjamin A. Kogan, local health officer, said yesterday.

Shots, which were interrupted a week ago by the withdrawal of Cutter vaccine from use, will start again Monday with children at Howard Wood, Meadow Park, and Lomita Elementary Schools scheduled to get their shots.

A Lawndale girl, who was taken to the County General Hospital for observation, was released this week, as doctors decided that she did not have polio.

Only Three Cases

Dr. Kogan pointed out that the Torrance area has had only three cases of polio since Jan. 1, compared with eight at the same time last year.

Shots will be resumed Monday with the Parke-Davis vaccine, which was flown in from the East. The schedule will be roughly the same, except that the dates have been moved up a week.

The second series of shots have been moved up two weeks, and will begin on May 23.

May 11—Hillside, Perry, and El Nido Schools.

The second series of shots will begin on May 23, with shots at Seaside, Riviera, and South Bay Christian Schools.
