

## Jester Hairston to Lead Choral Workshop Series

The newest and one of the most interesting features of the coming May Festival of the Arts will be a Choral Festival Workshop with Jester Hairston as guest conductor. This will be held on May 20, the first day of the three-day festival of art, music, and dance at Redondo Union High School under the auspices of the Civic Symphony and the Adult Education Department.

Hairston, well-known Southern choral conductor in the fields of school, church, radio, television, and motion pictures, appeared May 1 in the television production of "You Are There" in a dramatization of the Emancipation Proclamation. He recently completed the movie, "Hand of the Pharaohs" in which he conducts an eighty-voice choir. He has worked with Dmitri Tiomkin, training and conducting choirs in several motion pictures — "Duel in the Sun," "Red River," and the Grace Moore story. Many will recognize him as "Leroy" in the "Amos and Andy" show.

To Tour Orient  
Hairston rehearses the Walter Schumann singers in their negro spirituals. The Schumann singers have recorded several albums of his arrangements. One is "In That Great Gettin'up Mornin'" with Hairston as soloist. A member of the Pacific Music Clinic, which meets each summer at the College of the Pacific in Stockton, he has conducted student choruses of over a thousand singers. He has a chorus of about thirty singers who represent many races and all the major religions in America who will tour the Orient this fall under the auspices of the State Department as part of a good will program to illustrate our own democracy in action.

Singers who have worked with Hairston are enthusiastically anticipating this workshop. His effervescent person-

ality, sense of humor, spontaneity, and excellent conducting techniques promise a rewarding session for all singers in the South Bay.

Massed Choirs Planned  
The form of the Choral Festival this year will differ from that in the past. Instead of individual choir participation, the choirs and choruses will form one large massed chorus. Two numbers will be prepared in advance while the major portion of the festival will feature the study and singing of the spiritual under Hairston's noted direction. The invitation to participate goes out to all church, school, and community choirs and interested individuals who share an eagerness to further their musical experience.

Registration for the singers will be 50 cents with balcony seats reserved for guests and those who wish to observe. In order to distribute the two songs to be prepared, advance registration by the director or any individual singer should be made to Ted Misenheimer at Redondo Union High School. Registration begins at 7:30 p.m.
