SUNDAY SERMON CITES GOD'S SPIRITUAL POWER

"Ah Lord God! behold, thou hast made the heaven and the earth by the great power and stretched out arm, and there is nothing too hard for thee." This declaration of creative power from Jeremiah (32:17) is the Golden Text of the Lesson-Sermon titled "Is the Universe, Including Man, Evolved by Atomic Forces?" which will be read in all Christian Science churches Sunday.

The powerlessness of material laws to interfere with man's harmonious activity was demonstrated by Jesus when he walked the waves and calmed the stormy sea. John's Gospel (6:19-21) relates that the disciples saw "Jesus walking on the sea. . . and they were afraid. But he saith unto them, It is I. . . and they were not afraid. Then they willingly received him into the ship and immediately the ship was at the land whither they went."

In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" Mary Baker Eddy says, "To suppose that God constitutes laws of inharmonious is a mistake; discords have no support from nature or divine law; however much is said to the contrary." "Jesus walked on the waves, fed the multitude, healed the sick, and raised the dead in direct opposition to material laws." (pp. 183, 273)
