## Newly Passed Law Extends Cal-Vet List

A new law has added many veterans to the lists of those eligible for "Cal-Vet" farm or home financing and educational assistance, according to Mrs. Helen K. Dill, director of the Veterans Service Center.

Although their applications may have been rejected once, veterans who served even one day of active duty during wartime may now be eligible, she said. The veteran must have served 90 consecutive days of active duty with part of it during official wartime periods—Dec. 7, 1941 to Jan. 1, 1947 or June 27, 1950 to Jan. 31, 1955.

The previous requirement was that all 90 days had to be served during wartime.

The law does not go into effect until Sept. 7, but veterans may apply now for reconsideration and obtain certificates of eligibility as soon as the law becomes effective.

The eligibility is good for farm or home financing and up to \$1000 in state educational assistance for veterans who were born in California or entered military service as state residents. Further information can be obtained at the Veterans Service Center, 1622 Gramercy Ave.
