Roberts said the program, stressing group experience as a way to teach, is carefully planned, but elastic enough to permit activities suggested by the boys themselves.

Lucille Stroth Named to Office In State Group

A policewoman with more than 13 years of service on the Torrance and Compton police forces has been elected vice president of the one and only policewomen's organization in the country, the Women's Peace Officers' Association of California.

The new vice president, Miss Lucille Stroth, daughter of former Torrance Police Chief, John H. Stroth, announced immediately after her recent election that she would work to make the organization nationwide. She has been named chairman of the group's next convention in San Diego.

Miss Stroth has been an officer in the juvenile division of the Compton Police Department for four years. Prior to that time, she served as a policewoman on the Torrance force. Since she left the Torrance department, her father retired as Chief here after 30 years service.

Miss Stroth was elected to her office at the 28th annual convention of the association held recently in Stockton. She also is president of the Los Angeles County Policewomen's Association, which has 150 members. The state group has 300 members.

She says she is from a "police family." Her brother, Jay, also a former member of the Torrance department, is now a Deputy Sheriff working with the fugitive detail out of Los Angeles.

Both graduated from Torrance High School.

Adventists at Annual Church Camp Meeting

Torrance members of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church are attending the 53rd annual camp meeting of the church, which started a week ago and will close this Sunday in Lynwood.

Pastor Glenn L. Goffar heads the Torrance delegation to the affair, which is being held on a 36-acre camp site at 4100 Imperial Highway. All 135 members of the local church are in attendance at the meet, according to a spokesman for the group.

No Local Services Pastor Goffar revealed that local church services will not be held this Saturday. Instead, he stated, members of the Torrance congregation are urged to attend worship services at the camp meeting.

Church dignitaries who are scheduled to address the throng of worshippers include Elder R. R. Bietz, of Glendale, president of the church's Southern California Conference; George E. Vandeman, Washington, D. C. Associate World Ministerial Director, and W. R. Beach, Washington, D. C. secretary of the World Headquarters of Seventh-Day Adventists.

Closing Address Beach will officially close the convention Sunday at 7:30 p.m. with an address entitled "The Church Triumphant."

Tents have been erected to provide meeting places for all age groups in the church. Kindergarten, primary, junior, semiteen, youth and adult tents have been designated as places for meeting of each particular group.

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
