

# ANIMAL RABIES SERIOUS, HEALTH OFFICER WARNS

County Health Officer, Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, said Saturday that the animal rabies situation in Los Angeles County is serious at the present time and may become even more so before the year is over.

To date 58 dogs have died this year from the disease, Los Angeles City accounting for 35, and the remainder of the County 23. Rabies is more than 3 times as prevalent as it was last year.

The spread of the disease, it appears, started at 23rd and Wall Streets last January and has spread to the southern and southwestern parts of the County.

More than 20,000 dog bites have been reported in the County, and as a result approximately 400 persons bitten by rabid dogs have, or are being given Pasteur treatment.

Dr. Gilbert listed the following precautions against contracting rabies:

1. Do not attempt to handle small animals such as squirrels, gophers, skunks, etc., as the disease is prevalent in wildlife.
2. Do not let a dog run loose in areas frequented by wildlife.
3. If a dog shows a change in disposition or behavior, take it to a veterinarian for observation.
4. Report to the Health Department the complete circumstances of any animal bite.
5. Have your dog vaccinated against rabies.

# Low Grade Fuel Oils Stockpiled in Refineries Presents Problem

Economists, who are paid to be unhappy when everyone else feels fine, are wringing their brows just now over the petroleum refining industry. Certainly the oil companies are booming. Petroleum stocks make new highs on the New York Stock Exchange. The industry is 9 per cent above last year's level. There are 20 million more automobiles on the road than there were at World War II's end.

That last item, good business source though it is, presents the refiners with some large corollary problems. Petroleum, in today's efficient refineries, breaks up into these items: a lot of gasoline, some gases for petrochemical use, a little kerosene, rather more of the heavier but still volatile burning oils for heating, and a sizeable fraction which can be further divided into lubricating oils and bunker (lowest-grade) fuel oil.

No matter how efficient the refinery, that burning oil fraction is still fairly large. So, while automobiles are still burning up vast quantities of gasoline, the burning oils are accumulating and going into storage. Nor can demand for them be stimulated this fall, as it was, just by a little jet airplane pressure.

The more convenient gas heating has cut a big permanent chunk out of that market. So the economists ask themselves: What happens when gasoline demand wanes in the fall, and there's plenty of burning oil in storage? Do the refineries cut back buying crude? Does the fight over imported petroleum, obscured just now by high refinery runs, start all over again? Oil refining is a huge American job-giver, and if there's indignation in the industry it will affect all of us.

**COAL COMEBACK** — Europe's industrial upsurge is helping cut America's long-term coal industry back on its feet. Coal exports in the first months of 1955 were 10 million tons. That equals all 1954 sales abroad. Now shippers aim at a 25-million-ton total.

Overall, mine operators believe they will have sales of 425 million tons this year, with rising demand from utilities and steel mills offsetting the loss of railroad and home-heating demand. For the last few weeks, output figures have matched the tonnages of the winter of 1953, last year's busy period for coal miners.

**BIT'S O' BUSINESS** — Shoe manufacturers' orders for fall are running more than 10 per cent above year-ago levels. . . Pennsylvania Railroad's earnings for May were the highest for any May since 1945. . . Steel production last week topped 2,350,000 tons of ingots and castings for an all-time record.

**JET CATCHERS** — A device first conceived by a U.S. Air Force general during the Korean war has been adapted to safeguard valuable jet planes and keep them out of the neighbors' backyards. . . Republic Aviation Corp., Farmingdale, N. Y., has just built three remote-controlled runway crash barriers for \$125,000. They can make safe catches of landing jet planes and their pilots. . . The takeoff or speeding troubles. O. P. Hass, Republic flight director, says an F-84F Thunderbolt lighter-bomber, rolling at 150 miles an hour, can be stopped in half the distance it would need using its own brakes.

The catchers will preserve a safety record already excellent. In 10 years company test pilots have made more than 120,000 takeoffs and landings with no property damage or personal injury.

The device, brainchild of Maj. Gen. Samuel R. Brentnall, vice-commander of Far East Air Forces, can be raised across a runway in a split second by an impulse from the airport tower. A web of nylon, canvas and steel cable—with 72,000 pounds of chain for a convincing anchor—pulls the plane to a halt.

# Torrance Guard Armory Opened Here Last Week

Keys to the new Torrance National Guard Armory were handed over to Sgt. J. L. Garcia, first sergeant of the home town Co. E, 132nd Armored Engineer Battalion, Wednesday, by city and military officials.

Mayor Albert Zeno, Councilman Nick Drake and City Manager George Stevens were on hand for the occasion. Lt. Col. Harvey A. Miller, representing the State Adjutant General's office, presented the keys of the building to Sgt. Garcia.

State officials inspected the structure before handing the keys to local dignitaries. The building, at Cabrillo and Lincoln Ave., was constructed at an approximate cost of \$200,000. The local engineers will hold their regular Tuesday night meeting there, beginning next week.

Under the command of Capt. Douglas Horlander, the unit will convene tomorrow night at Civil Defense headquarters on Torrance Blvd. The men then will board trucks and head for the Manhattan Beach Armory, where they will load their equipment on the trucks and return to the new building to move in.

Official dedication of the armory will be held sometime in September, Capt. Horlander said. Meanwhile, the Torrance unit is preparing for their annual summer encampment. The Engineers will train for weeks at Camp Roberts in August.
