


Church News

RICHARD RICHARDS TO SPEAK TO METHODISTS

PAIR LEAVE FOR MEETS IN EUROPE

Edwin Kezar, of Torrance, and Ronald Ward, former resident, left for Europe Tuesday as representatives of the Torrance congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, according to George Kezar, presiding minister.

They will attend European assemblies of the Witnesses at London, Paris, Rome, Nuremberg, Stockholm, and The Hague during the summer. Some 4500 church members from the United States are expected to attend the six European assemblies.

The program is designed to acquaint the members of American churches with customs and conditions in Europe. Delegates from Central and South America, Australia, Africa, and the Far East also will be present. The Torrance representatives also plan to visit the Vatican City.

Kezar and Ward are slated to leave the East Coast late this week.

God Source Of All Life, Sermon Says

The thought that God is eternal life and the source of all true life and being, is emphasized in the Lesson-Sermon on "Life" in the Christian Science churches Sunday. The Golden Text is from I John (5:11) "This is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in the Son."

The Scriptures record, "A certain man was sick, named Lazarus, of Bethany . . . When Jesus came, he found that he had lain in the grave four days already . . . And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said, Father, I thank thee that thou hast heard me . . . And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth. And he that was dead came forth!" (John 11:1, 17, 41, 43, 44).

A correlative passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy reads, "If Jesus awakened Lazarus from the dream, illusion, of death, this proved that the Christ could improve on a false sense. Who dares to doubt this consummate test of the power and willingness of divine Mind to hold man forever intact in his perfect state, and to govern man's entire action?" (p. 493).
