Popular Pizza Pie Offered As 'Something' Different

The "Pizza Pie" rage which reportedly gathered popularity several years ago in the East, has reached Torrance. The old, Italian dish is enjoying a fresh round of popularity throughout the country and is being served as a main dish for dinners and Sunday evening suppers as well as everyday fare. This savory dish, sometimes called "tomato pie" can be the something different for lunch or dinner.

Mrs. William Speck of 1511 Acacia, is the local housewife who has acquired the knack of turning out a most delectable Pizza. PIZZA PIE Crust

- 1 package dry granular yeast or 1 cake compressed yeast
- 1 cup lukewarm water
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 tablespoon shortening
- 4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 egg white, beaten

Soften yeast in 1/4 cup of water. Let stand 10 minutes. To the remaining water add sugar, salt, shortening and 1 cup of the flour. Beat until very smooth. Add the yeast mixture and stir well. Thoroughly fold in egg white, then add flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out on lightly floured board, and knead until smooth and satiny, about 10 minutes. Place in a pan greased side up. Cover and let stand in a warm place, out of drafts to raise until double in bulk (about 1 hour). Knead dough. Roll dough out on board to slightly thicker than pie crust. This dough will make 2 1/2 very large pizzas. Pan size—16" by 11".

Topping

- 2/3 lb. cheese (Cheddar or Tillamook)
 - No. 2 can tomatoes
 - 1/2 can tomato sauce
 - 1/4 cup oil (salad or Olive)
 - 1/2 lb. pepperoni
 - Salt and pepper
 - Grated cheese
 - Mushrooms, Anchovies, other substitutes
 - Meats may be used instead of pepperoni
- Place thin slices of cheese of your choice, (1 prefer cheddar or tillamook) about 3/4 of an inch apart over entire crust. Then add pieces of canned or fresh tomato between cheese slices. Spoon on tomato sauce until all is fairly well covered with tomato or sauce. Then place thinly sliced pepperoni at 2" intervals. Pour oil over entire area. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Grate Italian cheese or use Parmesan over all. Bake in a very hot oven 450 degrees for 25 minutes or until brown. Cut and serve immediately with a tossed green salad.


