


## Plan All-City Picnic Sunday

An old-fashioned, family picnic will be sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Department, Sunday, at Torrance Park, with features designed to hold the interest of all members of the family.

The picnic will get under way at noon with races and games in the ball field area. Entries in the contest will be allowed under two classifications: boys and girls, 12 and under, and an open class, for all 13 and up.

Events planned for the outing include "roll the peanut," sack races, three-legged races, pie eating contest, cracker eating contest, blow-up paper bag contests, old clothes race, peanut in the spoon, balloon carrying, and a wheelbarrow race.

Events will be called over the public address system prior to

running. Ribbons and other awards will go to the winners. Time out for the picnic lunches with entertainment by the department presented from the bandshell will be scheduled between 1 p.m. and 2:15 p.m.

Between 2:30 and 4:30 the slo-pitch softball jamboree will see the top service club teams battling with the blue streak leaders. Each team will play for 30 minutes and the total running score will determine the league winner.

The Lions, Lutheran Men's Club, and Optimists will take on the National Blues, Jaycees, and Torrance Gardens homeowners on the main diamond, while the Elks, Kiwanis, California School Employees, and Waveria Businessmen will battle with the Rotary Club, City

Workers Local, Walteria Methodist Church, and the Fire Department teams in centerfield diamond.

Entertainment during the picnic hour will be furnished by youngsters from the city's various playgrounds.
