Mrs. Carl Axthelm, 1402 W. 215th St., won the first prize blue ribbon, in the porcelain bisque division of the California Ceramic Hobby Show, held at the Long Beach Civic Auditorium, Aug. 3-7. Entries were from all the western states and as far east as Ohio.

The two prize winning bisque lamps are hand carved and hand painted. The two matching "Alf and Heide" figurines are in ivory and rose and are mounted on brass bases. With their two hand-made shades they stand about 25 inches tall. Bisque has a soft finish and not a glaze.

Mrs. Axthelm has been interested in ceramics for several years and her home is tastefully decorated with her art treasures. About a year ago she and her sister, Mrs. Sanford Whiting became interested in porcelain bisque and have created some outstanding work.

Mrs. Axthelm is employed in the payroll department of National Supply, a position she has held for the past 11 years. Two nights a week she attends class at the Christine Studio in Long Beach and attributes much of her success to her teacher, Mrs. Orville Chase.

Along with the lamps, she has completed a beautiful collection of porcelain dolls, done in various pastels and trimmed with lace. Among other accomplishments are ceramic plates and other items which she has given as gifts to her friends.
