Fall practice sessions get underway today for the Torrance Tartar Varsity, as Coaches Don Porter and Jack Miller check their gridders in for physical exams and equipment hand outs.

Porter and Miller, who guided the Tartarbees to the Bay League title last fall, will employ the split "T" formation this year for the Tartars. Porter summed up his team's chances in the rough Bay League by saying the team was small physically, but could surprise with some real speed. Possibly the biggest and fastest Tartar is Skip Smith, 100-pound fullback. Smith, a veteran, will be counted on to carry a good deal of the offensive load, Porter said.

Lettermen Named
Varsity lettermen due to report today include Larry Lipincott, Ken Wheat and Jernel Wilkins, tackles; Jerry Hughes and John Gomez, halfbacks; Butch Hazel, center; Dave Conry, Stan Wilson and Bill Montgomery, guards; Ray Bundgard, end; Bill Meacham, quarterback, and Smith, fullback. Jim Smith, Craig Edman, Charley Valencia and Bobby Curran, up from the Bees, also are counted on to crack the squad. Edman, Gomez and Smith possess the majority of the speed on the squad. Porter said Gomez showed good action in spring drills, adapting himself to the cut and go tactics of the split "T" easily.

DANDOY RETURNS FOR BROWN, RAM GAME TOMORROW NIGHT

Aramis Dandoy, Torrance resident who is trying his hand at professional football with the Cleveland Browns, returns to the scene of his many triumphs tomorrow night when the World Champion Browns invade Memorial Coliseum for a practice tilt with the Los Angeles Rams. A former Torrance High and Southern California Trojan backfield star, Dandoy is in his first season with the Cleveland kingpins. The Browns have looked anything but champs in their exhibition season to date. Last Sunday, they were trampled by the San Francisco 49ers, 17-14, in a tough struggle at San Francisco. After a slow start, Dandoy has come along fast recently. He started the 49er-Brown game, but retired midway through the contest with a head injury. Brown officials say he will be ready for the Ram game tomorrow night, however. Dandoy was an All-Bay League selection at Torrance High and received prominent All-Coast honors at SC. He topped his Trojan Varsity career Jan. 1 in the Rose Bowl, when he broke the bowl record for punt return yardage on an 86-yard touchdown gallop. The Trojans were bumped, 20-7, by Ohio State in the mud at the Arroyo Seco oval. The Brown-Ram fray will probably turn into an aerial circus, with Norm Van Brocklin and Bill Wade pitching 'em for the Rams and George Ratterman tossing for Paul Browns eleven.
