Burglars Nab \$3400 in Six Entries Here

Burglars worked overtime over the holiday week end, entering six local establishments and making off with loot that totaled more than \$3400, according to Torrance Police Department detectives.

The Valdez Drive Inn Restaurant, 2700 Redondo Beach Blvd., and a tract contractor, building homes near 182nd St. and Crenshaw, suffered the worst losses.

Approximately \$1000 was taken from the Valdez Drive Inn, after burglars broke into the restaurant sometime between 11 p.m. Monday, and 6 a.m. Tuesday. The culprits took \$50 from a desk drawer, then proceeded to open Valdez' safe with an electric drill, where they collected \$900.

Don Hunt, who is constructing houses near the Crenshaw-182nd St. intersection, told police that someone took \$1200 in door locks from a storage house on his construction property over the week end.

The locks, more than 600 of them, were stored in a vacant four-bedroom home and adjoining garage.

A vacant three-bedroom home with garage was entered sometime over the week end and \$750 in garbage disposals and plumbing fittings were taken. Samuel Meyers, superintendent of the Beverly Construction Co., told local authorities.

Burglars reportedly pried their way into the house, which was on a tract near 185th St. and Arlington Ave.

A construction shed and tool storeroom, owned by the J and S Land Construction Co., and located at 4713 Sharynne Lane, suffered \$600 in losses. Police reports indicate that four saws, valued at \$450, and a 600-foot rubber loaded electric cord, priced at \$150, were taken.

The burglars reportedly gained entrance to the shed by sawing through the chain on the lock.

Loss of a case of 30-06 caliber rifle grenade ammunition from the Harvey Machine Co., was reported to authorities by Hervey officials. Nothing else was taken from the company's ammunition magazine, officials said.

Reports indicate entry was accomplished by breaking the door lock with a heavy chain.

William Pal, 17303 Castmir, notified police that someone entered his garage and took an assortment of tools, valued at approximately \$85.

Two Lomita Men Charged With Assault

Two Lomita men charged with assaulting a San Pedro man with a beer bottle and their fists after dragging him out of his car at Pacific Coast Hwy. and Walnut Ave. face a preliminary hearing Monday at 9:30 a.m. in South Bay Municipal Court.

The pair—George W. Wilson, 22, of 25515 Lucille Ave., and James William Thomas, 19, of 1735 W. 257th St.—are charged with an attack last Thursday on Eugene A. Kreshlin, 21, of San Pedro. Taken to Harbor General Hospital, he required three stitches in his elbow and eyebrow and six stitches on his forehead.

Ethel Patterson, 16, also of San Pedro, who was riding with Kreshlin, told sheriff's deputies that they were driving along Pacific Coast Hwy. when the pair came alongside and started shouting at them. As they stopped for the Walnut Ave. signal, the pair jumped from their car, opened Kreshlin's car door, and started pummeling him, she said.

Deputies, seeking the car, found it in a nearby drive-in, where they arrested Thomas, who they reported, was wearing a bloody T-shirt. The car disappeared and Wilson appeared, and was arrested. The car was later found at Pacific Coast Hwy. and Cypress Ave.

Deputies R. M. Griffin and R. L. Moore said the pair were quite violent as they were being taken to the station, and Moore's watch was broken in the struggle.
