Big Second Half Boosts California to Victory

California High broke loose for three second half touchdowns Friday night at Whittier as the Condors ripped open a hard-fought contest to smother Torrance, 32-13, in a practice affair. The running of speedy halfback Jack Holman and the pass snaring of 6'3" and Bill Ross shattered the Tartars defense in the second half. Holman, who tallied two touchdowns during the evening, ran his scoring total to 48 points in three contests on the strength of eight touchdowns.

Holman started it all shortly after the opening kick off, when he rambled 60 yards on a cutback to paydirt. Bob Lucas, Condor quarterback, booted the extra point.


The Condors took over again after a punt exchange and were driving on the Tartar goal when the locals found their defense and snatched the rushes of the Whittier crew.

Valencia Moves Tartars
With Charley Valencia at the helm, the Tartars were moving cautiously in their own territory when Valencia crossed up the defense by hitting end Tom Brown with a hook-in pass. The speedy flanker outraced Condor defenders to score. The play started on the Torrance 25. Fullback Skip Smith's extra point boot went wide. Score: California, 7; Torrance, 6.

A weird play with just minutes left in the first half enabled the winners to leave the field at intermission with a 13-6 lead. The play was resting on the California 37, when Holman bolted through tackle and hit the Torrance defensive secondary only to fumble. The ball took a high hop down field and Holman, edging ahead at full steam, picked it up on the Tartar 48 and raced all the way to the seven before he was brought down from behind by Smith.

Lucas backed up on second down and connected on a flanker pass to Ross for the score. The attempted extra point kick was no good.

Following the second half kick off, the two teams exchanged the ball and then Holman went to work again. He scampered 62 yards on a pitch out to score. Lucas' kick was good. Score: California, 20; Torrance, 6.

Dick Custer for the score. Torrance 10 booted the ball through the posts. Score: California, 20; Torrance, 13.

Ross took a hook-in pass for 64 yards and a touchdown on the first play after the kick off and the Condors boosted their lead to 26-13. The attempted conversion went wide. Ross scored the final tally minutes later on a 38 yard pass from side signal caller Dick Custer. Again the conversion was missed.

Two Injured
The Tartars suffered two more losses to key personnel when ends Tommy Kulp and Dick Haulicker were raked up in the fray. Kulp is reportedly through for the season after suffering a dislocated elbow and Haulicker's leg had to be sewed up when he was stepped on in a pile up.

After being shell-shocked during the first half, the North High Saxons came alive to contain a good El Cajon club after the intermission but the damage had already been done as the Border City lads upended Cliff Graybell's eleven, 24-6, Friday night on the THS field.

The locals gave away a pair of second quarter touchdowns to the invaders, both on long pass plays to seal their own doom. With the score tied midway through the second period, 6-6, El Cajon quarterback Joe Contreras pitched for a pair of touchdowns in quick succession to give the winners' an 18-6 halftime lead.

One of the pass plays covered 25 yards, the other 40 yards. **Start Fast**
El Cajon got right into the act as they took the opening kick off and rambled 60 yards on a sustained drive to score. A pitch out around end supplied the six points.

Neither team converted throughout the practice fray. The Saxons came back to tie the score on a pass from fullback Ray Grieshaber to end Roger Snell. The play covered the final five yards, after the locals had set up the score on a 60 yard screen pass. Grieshaber dropped back and hit quarterback Loren Jones at the line of scrimmage with the heave and Jones followed blockers from the North 30 yard line to the El Cajon five before the was stopped.

That was all the scoring for the locals. Following intermission, El Cajon came out ready to rip away again at the Saxons' defense. But the NHS eleven stiffened and contained the heavy invader backs. A defensive lapse in the final minutes gave the winners their final score.

About the only thing Saxons coaches could yell for all night was the line play of Bill Reeves, guard, center Al Bledsoe and guard Jim Whitley. The three formed a rugged barrier in backing up the line and Reeves in particular got plaudits from Graybell.

Passing Game Off
Grieshaber's passing, which was a high point of the season opener with Artesia, was not as sharp as previously. He ran with authority on line plunges, however.

Graybell said he was pleased with the play of 200-pound tackle Dan Hayes, who saw his first real test of fire in the game. Hayes, a junior, banged down quarterback Contreras time and again when the shifty runner would slide along the line, keeping from the split "T" formation.

Fewer Ducks For Opening

Unless more ducks crop winging south within the next 10 days Southern California will have fewer birds than last year when the state's split 1955 waterfowl hunting season opens on Saturday.

Department of Fish and Game field men report some what fewer ducks than last year on all Southland waterfowl areas from Imperial Valley northward to Santa Barbara County.

Several thousand ducks - mostly sprig - are now feeding on the Wister unit of the state's Imperial waterfowl management area while the Hazard and Finney-Ramer units hold a scattering of sprig, teal and spoonies. About 100 white-headed geese are reported on the Hazard unit. More ducks are expected to move to these public shooting areas when the firing starts on nearby private clubs.

Hunters are reminded that on the Hazard-Wister area opening day, shooting hours will be from 12 noon until 5 p.m. and on Sunday, Oct. 16, from 5:15 a.m. until 2 p.m. These shooting hours apply only to the Hazard-Wister area.
