


Church News



DRIVE-IN CHURCH? . . . Half of the old auditorium at the First Baptist Church stands ready to be moved, as the church began its building program last week. The old buildings will be moved to another church, and \$120,000 structure will replace them.

Baptists Begin Building Work

An extensive building program at the First Baptist Church, 2118 Carson St., has caused duplicate Sunday morning worship services there, according to the Rev. C. Miles Northrup, pastor.

Services will be held at 9 and 11 a.m. each Sunday, he said. The church now has nearly 1200 members. Work started last week on removal of the wooden auditorium which has served the church for the past 43 years. As soon as it is removed, work will begin on \$120,000 additions to the church, including a social hall, recreational facilities, and more Sunday school classrooms.

New Buildings Set
The new buildings will be built at the east end of the present church, and when completed will be a U-shaped structure. The old wooden building is now being removed, and will

Adam, Fallen Man Named Sunday Topic

The fact that God created man in His own image and likeness as recorded in the first chapter of Genesis is the leading point in the Lesson-Sermon on "Adam and Fallen Man" in all Christian Science churches Sunday.

This citation from Genesis (1:27) affirms, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."

Following this spiritual account of the creation of man, the record also sets forth another view. Of these views Mary Baker Eddy says in "Science and Health With Key to the Scriptures": "The first record assigns all might and government to God, and endows man out of God's perfection and power. The second record chronicles man as mutable and mortal, — as having broken away from Deity and as revolving in an orbit of his own" (p. 522).

The Golden Text is from Ephesians (5:8), "Ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light."

LUTHERANS CONTINUE VISITATION

Teams of visitors from the First Lutheran Church, Carson and Flower, are taking part in the reaching mission of the evangelism program now being carried on in the church.

During several briefing sessions, visitors were instructed in lay evangelism methods and received a challenge as to the importance of the work. The church feels the need to minister to the community when, according to statistics, more than half of the people in any community are outside of the church, the Rev. Paul Wenske said. All members of First Lutheran Church were visited before the mission and many visits to the unchurched will be made during this week.

The teams of visitors from First Lutheran Church are part of a larger body of visitors in this area. With more than 100 churches taking part in the evangelism program of the churches of the National Lutheran Council, 3355 lay visitors have pledged themselves to help. During the pre-Mission visitation, 3860 workers visited 18,738 people.
