

Number of Precincts in Riviera Increased from Nine to Twenty

To relieve the vote counters and provide faster returns at election time, the office of the Registrar of Voters announced last week that they have carved up Riviera into 20 new precincts.

Up in number from nine to 20, these new precincts will serve approximately 100 to 130 voters each, instead of the former 250 to 300 voters each. With very few exceptions, it was reported, most local residents will have a new place of voting in the 1956 elections, and the returns from this area will be in and registered in about half the time.

Big things are happening in the Little League. That's the report from Arlen Charter, newly re-elected vice president of Pacific Coast Little League, following the league's meeting last Wednesday at Newton School.

Presiding at the meeting were the Pacific Coast Little League officers, recently elected to head up the group's 1955-56 season. Re-elected as president was Al Marzilli, with Charter as vice president and Art O'Keefe as secretary. Bill Brooks will serve as treasurer.

The meeting was held to acquaint the membership with the program lined up by the officers for the coming year. John Langston, chairman of the sprinkler system committee, reported on the installation of a new and more adequate system, total cost of which was estimated at \$10,000. He received a vote of confidence from the assemblage.
