

Hampton Players Stage Successful Theatre Hit

By MILDRED HUNT Talented cast of the Hampton Players gave a good account of themselves last Saturday evening, in summing up a high total of enjoyable theatre during their fourth and last presentation of Frank Vosper's English drama, "Love From A Stranger". The play took place on the auditorium stage of the Redondo Union High School. In a classy performance by all members of the cast, a light mystery drama unfolded in an entertaining three act dramatization which featured two complete changes of scenery and a build up to a smashing climax dramatically revealing the true identity of the stranger with love in one hand and ulterior motives in the other. Sharing equal honors with the performers was the remarkable detailed sets which could be honestly rated on a footing with those of the professional theatre. The sets were not of the makeshift variety with blotchy coloring or poorly constructed frames usually accompanying community theatre productions. On the contrary, the scenery and artistic arrangements of the stage had been skillfully worked out in order to produce such flawless, natural and highly pleasing scenes. A rare accomplishment in the amateur field. The first scene opened on an original note in that the talkative aunt played by Ethel Dugan, was bending over an open suitcase with her rear quarters facing the audience. She quickly straightened up and in a comical way proceeded to straighten her clothes including her girdle. Throughout the play, she provided the same comedy with her spontaneous actions and provocative questions. Charming playing the lead role was petite Pat Rogers as Cecily Harrington, spinster about to be married but changing her mind after winning a goodly sum on a sweepstake ticket. Co-winner with her was room-mate, Mavis Wilson, ideally played by attractive Dorothy Tunis. Nigel Lawrence the jilted lover was tormentedly played by able Bruce Wilson and Bruce Lovell, the mysterious stranger played with a man-of-the-world air by applicable Von Hershey. Supporting players were Hodgson the gardener diligently played by Jack Erving, Ethel, the maid, energetically played by Helen Ferrel and Dr. Gribble, the village doctor, suavely played by James Wilson. LOCAL GIRLS AT STATE CONCLAVE


