Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. today at Green Hills Cemetery for William Carl Walberg, 2 1/2 months, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Walberg, of 2696 Ridgeland Rd., who suffocated at his home early Thursday morning.

The youngster swallowed his tongue shortly after 8 a.m. Thursday. His parents called police and local authorities, including the Fire Department's resuscitator squad, answered the call. Prolonged efforts to revive the boy failed, however.

The victim of the tragedy leaves, in addition to his parents, a brother, Robert, 2, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Walberg, of Portuguese Bend, are the paternal grandparents, while Mrs. Helen Parker, of San Diego, is the boy's maternal grandmother.

Zaun to Report On Shoestring School Routes

Cecil G. Zaun, safety director for the Los Angeles City Board of Education and members of his staff who have just completed an inspection of school routes in the Shoestring area, will disclose their findings Tuesday evening, at the regular meeting of the Councilmanic Advisory committee at Normandie Playground, Councilman John S. Gibson announced yesterday.

Principal topic will be routes to be taken by children attending the new 223rd and Meyer St. school, crossing over the Pacific Electric tracks and Normandie Ave. Zaun and his staff, working with both the city and county, hope to have solved the problem to provide a safe, dry route to school.

Safe Driving Day Here Finds 2 Persons Hurt

Despite a steady downpour and bleak, gray skies, only two persons were injured here in traffic on Safe Driving Day, Thursday, according to local police.

In the only injury accident of the day, Ellen Rassar, 9, and Melissa Rassar, 38, of Wilmington, received minor injuries when vehicles driven by Joseph F. Bevan, 20, of Long Beach, and James B. Rassar, 17, of Wilmington, collided at Hawthorne Blvd. and 174th St.

The injured were treated at Torrance Emergency Hospital. The mishap occurred at 2:50 p.m.

Three other accidents also were recorded here on S.D. Day, but damage was limited to property only.

Man Sought For Indecent Exposure

Two instances of indecent exposure were reported to police Friday in widely separated sections of Torrance.

One of the reports came from Torrance High School, the other from a market at Pacific Coast Hwy. and Hawthorne Blvd.

Police reports indicate they received a call from the high school early in the afternoon, which reported that a man had performed an indecent act in front of two girls.

Later in the evening a caller told police that a man had exposed himself in front of a woman and her young child in front of the market.

County Planners To Consider PV Dump Site Bid

The County Regional Planning Commission will consider the petition for zone exception to establish a disposal site in the abandoned dealite mine just south of Torrance along Crenshaw Blvd.

The planners will act on the recommendation of the County Zoning Board to approve the disposal site as requested by Chief County Sanitation Engineer A. M. Rawn to serve Torrance and other southwest county areas.

If the planners approve the proposal without protest, the petition is considered to be granted. If it is protested, the Board of Supervisors will be called upon to render a decision on the matter.

Deputies Seek Sex Pervert After Attack

Sheriff's deputies yesterday were seeking a 24-year-old Victorville man on counts of sex perversion, robbery and kidnaping after a Tuesday attack on a 15-year-old Narbonne High School student.

The man, who has a long record of previous arrests, picked up the boy near Pacific Coast Hwy. and Walnut Ave., Tuesday, telling him that he would take him to Wilmington.

Instead, the boy said, the man drove the car into the Palos Verdes hills on the pretext that he was going to pick up a sewing machine.

The man drove to a secluded spot and forced the boy to submit to acts of sex perversion and other indignities, the boy said. The man also took \$4.80 from his billfold, the boy reported. As they returned from the hills, the car ran out of gas near 254th and Pennsylvania Ave., and the youth eluded his kidnapper.

Sheriff's deputies passing shortly afterward noticed the man acting suspiciously by the car, and as they approached, he fled and managed to elude deputies.

He was identified from papers found in the car and a warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Two Hurt In Traffic Crashes

Two persons were injured in a pair of separate traffic mishaps here, one Friday morning and the other early Saturday morning.

Clarence E. Twombly, 59, of Gardena, suffered head injuries when his car left the road on Torrance Blvd., near Western Ave., on Friday. The front end of his car was completely demolished.

Twombly was taken for treatment of lacerations and other injuries to a Gardena hospital.

Vida R. Floyd, 27, of Lomita, suffered injuries when cars

driven by William P. Floyd, 23, of Lomita, and Joseph J. Ban, 25, of 1412 Crenshaw Blvd., collided at Crenshaw and 171st St., early Saturday morning.

The injured party was transported to Torrance Emergency Hospital for treatment.
