Local Chef Wins 'Oscar' in Recent Culinary Art Exhibit

Presentation of this country's "Oscar" of the restaurant industry to a Douglas Aircraft Co. chef apparently indicates that the people charged with daily mass feeding of thousands of factory workers are as well versed in fancy foodcraft as are many of the nation's more renowned cooks.

That was the opinion expressed this week by J. V. Thompson, manager of the welfare Dept. at the El Segundo division of Douglas which operates cafeterias in the company's El Segundo and Torrance plants.

José Gomez, administrative chef at the El Segundo plant, won a sterling silver "Oscar" for his entries in the individual tray-fancy foods division at the 1955 Los Angeles Culinary Arts Exhibit held recently in the Statler Hotel. Gomez resides at 1561 Second St., Manhattan Beach.

The 12-inch statuette of Auguste Escoffier, famed French chef, was presented to Gomez as second highest award of the show—a gold "Oscar" having been awarded to a chef for a big name Las Vegas hotel. A chef in the Douglas El Segundo cafeterias for the past four years, Gomez said he achieved a life-time ambition in winning the coveted trophy.

Judges on design, color, craftsmanship, and usefulness, Gomez' entries consisted of the following savory delicacies:

"King's Crown"—a roast crown or rib rack of lamb with a gelatin mold forming the top of the crown, colorfully decorated with peas, carrots, plums, hard-boiled egg slices, and multi-colored paper chop holders, and topped by the crown, full of king's cross.

"Gypsy Mandolin"—a baked ham decorated with cream sauce set in gelatin and decorated with stuffed olive slices, truffles, a wooden handle, and colored strings.

"Neptune Surprise"—a baked salmon loaf utilizing the head and tail of the salmon, tissue thin slices of radishes for scales, and coked shrimp for vertical fins, and the entire delight held firm by a thin coat of clear gelatin.

"Cinderella Slipper"—a boiled beef tongue covered with white sauce set in gelatin with the slipper effect attained by weaving strips of egg plant skin and affixing a silver metallic bow.

Gomez, who had worked dozens of hours in making the ingenious gourmet delicacies, later donated them on behalf of Douglas to a Los Angeles charitable organization.
