

### GP Confirms New Deep Well

General Petroleum Corp. today confirmed the completion of a new oil well at Santa Fe Springs, and the discovery of a new deep zone in the 35-year-old field. The new well, Santa Fe Springs 243, flowed 74 barrels the first hour through a 48 1/2" bean with a tubing pressure of 350 lbs. per square inch. It was first reported in the HERALD last Monday.

The completion depth of the well was 9010'.  
"We feel very good about it," R. L. Minckler, president of General Petroleum, said, "but it is too soon to know how good it will prove to be or how extensive in area."  
"The oil is clean," Minckler said, "and has a gravity of 30.0° API."
