



State's License Plate Tab For 1957 to Reflect Light

California's new "glow-in-the-dark" stickers for the 1957 vehicle registration renewal will be issued to the vast majority of the state's 7,000,000 motorists between Jan. 2 and Feb. 4, 1957, according to Paul Mason, director of motor vehicles.

Packaged by the Department of Corrections at Folsom, they are now in stock at 115

DMV permanent offices, 100 selected metropolitan banks, which may issue them only to holders of 1957 punched card fee statements, additional temporary DMV stations manned by travel crews, and the authorized travel clubs and associations.

Stickers Glow
The stickers—which "glow" by reflecting the lights of oncoming cars—are to be applied to the flat yellow portion of the rear license plate between the word "California" and the raised black area which reads "56," Mason reported.

Here's how the reflectorized stickers are applied:

1. Clean well the flat yellow portion of the rear plate between "California" and "56." (It is not necessary to remove the plate.) Be sure the area is dry before applying sticker.
2. Read instructions. Carefully remove the paper backing on the rear of the sticker by bending the sticker at the scored point where the paper backing is cut. Then peel the backing toward the sides. Read the instructions on the backing before removing.
3. Apply the sticker by pressing it firmly into place. A tough adhesive bonds the sticker to the plate.

Motor vehicle department officials declare that the new reflective stickers will be less subject to theft or fraudulent transfer than the hook-on metal tabs formerly used. They will also permit enforcement officers to check validity of registrations more effectively at night.

The new stickers are 1 1/2 by 1 1/2 inches in size. They have a red background with black letters and numerals.

Improved Company Benefit Plan Made Public by G.P.

Substantial improvements in company benefit plans for some 6500 General Petroleum Corp. employees were announced today by Robert L. Minckler, president.

The plan, approved by the General Petroleum board of directors, is identical to one announced by Socony Mobil Oil Company, Inc. General Petroleum is the far western affiliate of Socony.

One of the major features of the modified plan concerns employee savings. Employee holders of the company stock under the plan will be able to vote their shares through a trustee. All of the changes, Minckler pointed out, are con-

tingent upon the approval of the Internal Revenue Service. With such approval, the 6500 employees of General Petroleum and the employees of its affiliates in the United States will add 20,000 shareholders to the present roster of 181,000 voting shareholders.

Through this savings plan, employees of General Petroleum, Socony Mobil and Magnolia Petroleum Co. in the southwest, now own 920,000 shares of Socony Mobil stock, or slightly more than 2% of the shares outstanding.

Other changes in the savings plan include an increase in the ratio of the company's contributions to the allotments made by employees from their pay, and liberalization of the provisions pertaining to withdrawal from the plan.

First to provide for individual choice in a savings plan. The other benefit plans affected are the retirement annuity plan and related plans. Liberalization of the annuity plan will result generally in increases in the pensions of employees retiring on or after Dec. 31, 1956.
