
Mayor Isen praised the part the schools played in winning the award for the city and urged the THS students to be better citizens so that at some future date, Torrance again may win the coveted honor.

Scores of the city's service clubs, PTAs, and civic groups joined in the parade yesterday afternoon as the decorated units paraded through north Torrance, south Torrance, and the downtown area.

Torrance Man Held in Hit-Run Death of Two Boys Yesterday

A 22-year-old Torrance man has been arrested on suspicion of driving a hit-run auto which struck and killed two 17-year-old youths near here early yesterday.

CHP officers said Glass and Short were walking along Vermont Ave. near El Segundo Blvd. about 2 a.m. yesterday when a car struck them, hurling their bodies into the mud beside the road where they


remained undiscovered for nearly two hours. A passerby found the bodies and notified police. Both youths were pronounced dead on arrival at Park Emergency Hospital in Gardena.

Following discovery of the bodies, officers found a car mired in a nearby field and traced ownership to Gray. Gray said he knew he hit something, CHP officers said,

It caused his car to go out of control and into the field. He said he walked home and returned with an uncle to make an unsuccessful attempt to get the car out of the mud. Failing to get the car out, he returned home and went to bed, officers reported. Notification of relatives of one of the two dead youths was delayed when identifica-

tion carried by Short was that of Paul Council, also 17, of Gardena. When officers went to the Council home to notify the parents of the tragedy, they discovered that the Council boy was asleep at the time. He told officers that he had loaned his identification papers to Short.

Both bodies were taken to McMillan's Funeral Home in Gardena.
