Business manager for the second consecutive semester will be Mrs. Olivia Diaz of Gardena. Mrs. Bernice Crampton of Inglewood will serve as staff photographer.

Reporters will be Gary Fowler of Torrance, Ruth Sanford of Hawthorne, Ron D. Terry of Torrance, Mrs. Jean Mary McDowell of Hawthorne, and Robert Crowe of Hermosa Beach. Crowe will also write the weekly feature column, "Something to Crowe About."

**In 10th Year**  
The Warhoop, financed by the Associated Students of El Camino College, has been published for the past 10 years, receiving six consecutive All-American awards from the Associated Collegiate Press,

whose headquarters are at the University of Minnesota. Numerous other awards have been won at press conferences throughout the Southland.

A second laboratory class is offered in journalism this semester, featuring work experience in the field of public relations. Among the activities of this staff is the transmission of news to 21 local and metropolitan newspapers. Preparations of handbills, brochures, photographs, and other phases of promotion for industrial, business, civic and other organizations is included in the course.

The Cast Party was held on stage after the show, the band entertaining. For those who weren't through partying, Dick Greenlaw held a party which was terminated at breakfast time.


