Baptists Will Hear of Work With Youths

Rev. Nick Neufeld, western area director of juvenile protection for the American Baptist Convention, will speak at Calvary Baptist Church, 2818 Manhattan Beach Blvd., Gardena, Sunday morning at duplicate services, 8:30 and 11 a.m.

The work of juvenile protection is carried on by the American Baptist Convention in an effort to help and to prevent juvenile delinquency. Organized activities are encouraged and initiated in city churches wherever statistics show delinquency to be a problem.

Summer camps for junior citizens (children who are or who may become delinquent due to environment and circumstances) have been held in Southern California by the American Baptists for the past two years.

Rev. Edward Rapp, national director of juvenile protection for the American Baptist Convention, made a survey of the Gardena area in 1952-53 and recommended that work be started in churches here.

At the evening service on Sunday, the pastor will speak on "Two New Testament Problem Texts, John 20:23 and I Corinthians 15:29."

Scarlet Fever Top Disease

Scarlet fever was the leading disease in Torrance and the Torrance health district, during the week ending Feb. 8, the County Health Department reported.

Torrance had six reported cases of the disease, while other areas had three. Torrance had four cases of measles, while four were reported in other parts of the district.

Other diseases during the week included epilepsy, gonorrhea, whooping cough, and syphilis, each two, and mumps and tuberculosis, each one.
