Workers to Canvass City Today for Heart Campaign

Torrance's Heart Sunday task force of women volunteers will move out today at 1 p.m., "rain or shine" carrying the "Torch of Hope" in the fight against heart disease to every neighborhood.

In their mass collection for the 1957 Heart Fund, a large number of volunteers, led by district captains and area chairmen, will call on 10 to 20 homes along their assigned streets.

The Heart Sunday goal for Los Angeles County is \$400,000.

Mrs. Olive Veach, local chairman, said that never before, in the four years that

Heart Sunday collections have been conducted nationally, have so many communities joined in the effort.

Point of Emphasis
"Heart Sunday is the point of emphasis of the month-long February drive for \$1,000,000 to support the Heart Assn.'s program of medical research, education and community services aimed at reducing the toll of death and disability wrought by the heart and circulatory diseases," Mrs. Veach said.

"Last year, heart disease caused nearly 27,000 deaths in Los Angeles County.

State to Leave Highway Open

Closing of the Pacific Coast Hwy. opening opposite Paseo de Gracia will not be required by the State Division of Highways, City Manager George Stevens reported yesterday. Stevens said Edward T. Telford, assistant state highway engineer, had withdrawn the State's condition

that the Paseo de Gracia opening be closed as part of the permit to open Tullia Ave. and Vista Del Parque.

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Residents Protest
Scores of Riviera residents protested the closing of the highway divider opposite Paseo de Gracia on the ground that it would force heavy traffic across narrow residential streets as new routes out of the residential section onto Pacific Coast Hwy. were sought.

Telford said the State's condition that the closure be made would be withdrawn because of the city's objections, and because of the inadequate roadway width of Vista Del Parque.

Other matters on the agenda for Tuesday's 8 p.m. Council meeting include a request from Wilburn E. Baker, president of the Inter-City Highway Committee, requesting city support in sending a delegation to Sacramento for the March meeting of the State Highway Commission. The committee seeks to speed work on the San Diego Freeway through the South Bay-Torrance areas.

Drale Chairman
Councilman Nick Drale will be chairman of a three-man delegation which will include

Edmund Rae of Hermosa Beach and G. S. Honey of Palos Verdes Estates. The committee also asks that the city send other delegates to strengthen the request for faster action on Southwest freeways.

The North Torrance Civic Improvement Assn. will request the Council to begin action to acquire a right of way through the General Petroleum Refinery here to link up Madrona Ave. and Prairie.

"We feel that this project is extremely necessary to the people of this area," President John K. Kesson said in a letter to the Council.

Contract for School OK'd

Award of a \$399,632 contract for construction of new facilities for the 232nd Pl. Elementary School was approved this week by the City Board of Education, according to Board President Mrs. Edith K. Stafford.

The contract, calling for construction of the school's first permanent facilities to replace temporary structures, was awarded to the Carter-Mack Builders, Inc., low bidders of nine firms seeking the project.

The new elementary school plant will be constructed at 23240 So. Archibald Ave., and will include six major buildings to accommodate 450 pupils.

Structures on the elementary school campus will include the multi-purpose building, main administration building and four classroom buildings. been made on the master plan for continued use of several of the existing buildings now on the site.
