


New South High School Facilities to Include Huge \$750,000 Gymnasium


New School To Open in September

A \$750,000 gymnasium will be part of the \$2,302,000 to South High School, now under construction at Calle Mayor and Pacific Coast Hwy., according to Superintendent J. H. Hull and Architect Roy Donley.


According to plans which Donley presented to the educators, the gym will be a single structure, built of concrete, steel, reinforced brick masonry, and will contain complete gymnastic equipment and facilities for both boys and girls. A gymnasium with a seating capacity of 2300 will be provided for spectators at athletic events and for use as a school auditorium.

South High School is expected to be completed for use this September, but the gym will not be completed until February, 1958.

A third contract, for additional classrooms, a library, and cafeteria, will be let this fall.
