Y'S 'LEARN-TO-SWIM' CLASS STARTS APRIL 15

The Torrance YMCA's learn-to-swim campaign for the Easter holiday April 15 to 19 reached the final planning stages last week as Joseph Frediak, Torrance teacher and part-time YMCA staff member, was named instructor for the lessons.

Predisik will have 10 trained assistants to aid with each class of 40 boys.

The lessons are open to any boy in the Torrance area between the ages of 8 and 12 who does not know how to swim. Each boy will be assigned to a half-hour class with other boys from his neighborhood. The YMCA is urging parents to share the ride in order to save transportation costs to the Torrance Municipal Plunge.

Thus far only 60 boys have signed up for the classes and there is ample room for an additional 200 boys. They must register at the Torrance YMCA by phone or in person, and a low fee will be paid to cover admission to the pool, instruction, certificates, and training materials.

Milt Isbell, chairman of the YMCA program committee, pointed out that the "Y" is also conducting several other programs for boys who already know how to swim. One of the trips is to Death Valley for three days, designed for boys 11 to 16 years of age. Another trip tours San Diego for two days, and is designed for boys 8 to 12.
