**Garden Chatter**

Roses have always been a favorite plant of mine the same as many other gardeners and when the yearly All America Roses Selections are announced we are always interested.

Since its founding in 1939, the AARS has declared only 48 All Americas and regional award winners. The AARS continues to intensify its rigid trial testing in 22 official test gardens throughout the United States and rose hybridizers are concentrating more and more on a combination of beauty, usefulness and hardiness in their new creations.

Fusiller is one of two winners in the popular floribunda class. It is a spectacular orange-red rose, the flowers arriving in large clusters. It is free blooming, and falls in a color class where it has little good competition.

The third winner for 1956 is Gold Cup and also a floribunda. This new variety is a deep yellow, a very vigorous grower, and blooms over a long period of time.

These roses will not be available in quantity until next bare root season, but you are going to read more and more about them this spring and summer. There may be a limited number available this fall in 5-gallon containers, so check with your nurseryman.

Three fine varieties have been selected as meeting these rigid requirements and are now being announced for the coming 1958 season. These are: White Knight, Fusiller, and Gold Cup.

White Knight was developed by the creator of that all-time great rose, Peace, and brings at long last to the rose world that nearly perfect white rose. White Knight is pure white, with large exquisitely formed buds and open flowers, has outstanding substance for a white rose with petals heavy and waxy. It is a strong, upright plant.

**City Council Promises to Study Riviera Branch Library Request**

With nearly three score home and property owners in attendance, the Hollywood Riviera Homeowners Assn. held its monthly meeting last week at Riviera School. Ben Russell, newly elected head of the organization, presided.

Russell read a letter from the city clerk of Torrance advising that the Homeowners' request for a branch library in Hollywood Riviera had been read before the City Council. The clerk's letter added that no action could be taken until after the June budget meeting.

Meanwhile, the Council has turned the matter over to Kroeger and Associates, who are drawing up a master plan of parks and facilities for the City of Torrance. They will study the feasibility of situating a branch library there.

Rivierans don't think it's so feasible to pay a goodly fee to Redondo Beach each year to use the library there. This smacks of taxation without representation. Of course, just as the English King said to our forefathers "You don't have to drink the tea," so some today might say "You don't have to read the books." But neither remark solves anything. Our forefathers thought it feasible to dump the tea in Boston Bay as an answer. Rivierans think it feasible to have their own, adequate branch library.

**'Healing' Is Sermon Topic This Sunday**
