**Kiwanis Clubs to Campaign For Voters Again in 1956**

Kiwanis clubs throughout the United States will sponsor Ballot Battalion campaigns in April and May, communities again this year. It was announced here yesterday by Lester King, chairman of the Torrance Kiwanis Club's ballot battalion committee.

The Ballot Battalion campaign is a three-fold one, King said. Clubs will urge citizens to register, to inform themselves on candidates and issues, and to vote—in both primary and general elections.

In calling on the nation's nearly 4,000 Kiwanis clubs to take an aggressive but non-partisan role in "getting out the vote," International President J. A. Raney quoted the endorsements of the Ballot Battalion made by Paul Butler, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and Leonard W. Hall, of the Republican National Committee.

Both men, national leaders of their political parties, wholeheartedly approved the Ballot Battalion project.

"All success to you in your campaign to inform and stimulate American citizens to exercise the privilege and responsibility of casting their ballots," Butler said.

"By knowing the candidates and their platforms, and by registering and finally by voting on election day, all Americans must again prove to the world how valuable is the freedom of choice which we enjoy," Hall said.

A concentrated local campaign is planned prior to the June primary election, King said.
