Food Chain Managers Vie For 'Good Citizen' Honor

Over 500 super market and food store managers were named "Good Citizens of 1956" today by the National Association of Food Chains and its members in communities throughout the United States and in Canada.

The managers, representing 42 states and two Canadian provinces were chosen from more than 900 managers who participated in the Second Annual Citizenship Award Program of the National Association of Food Chains. Many of them were named Good Citizens for the second year.

Each manager will receive an engraved, hand-lettered certificate naming him a "Good Citizen of 1956" and citing him for his fine record of achievement in the civic and community affairs of the town or city where he lives and works. So far as NAFC can determine, the Citizenship Award Program is the first industry-wide program to honor employees at the local level for their citizenship activities.

The program received a George Washington Honor Medal from the Freedoms Foundation March 16, in recognition of its effort to encourage good citizenship on the part of all Americans.

Each of the 83 NAFC member companies participating in the program—ranging in size from annual sales of \$2 million to \$2 billion—distributed a special questionnaire to their managers last fall. The questionnaire was developed for the program by the Citizenship Education project of the Teachers College of Columbia University. It is designed to rate a manager's citizenship qualities and the extent of his participation in civic and community affairs.

Responses scored. The questionnaires were then scored by means of a confidential rating scale—also developed by Columbia—and the managers making the top 10 per cent of the scores were selected as "Good Citizens of 1956." The questionnaire includes questions on subjects such as charity work, participation in school and PTA activities, religious activities, voting and encouraging others to vote, and other community activities.

Each company participating in the program is now eligible to nominate one manager for a National Good Citizenship Award. Nominations will be submitted to a jury of outstanding citizens including J. Addison Wagner, National Commander of the American Legion; Hue McKenna, president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce; and Dr. John Hannah, president of Michigan State University, and former Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower. The national winners will be honored at the 23rd annual meeting of NAFC, Oct. 7-10 in Chicago.

The National Association of Food Chains is an industry association whose members employ hundreds of thousands of people in communities throughout the United States and in Canada, Mexico, and several other countries. Association members operate some 12,000 chain super markets and food stores.
