# Out-of-Use Articles Can Provide Work for Homeless

Out-of-use articles in Torrance homes can be put to good use in the Salvation Army Social Service Center which serves this area.

The articles can provide vital occupational therapy for homeless and handicapped men who repair them in workshops of the big center.

They will be sought here during the annual Salvation Army Salvage Week drive, April 23-28, when Red Shield trucks will call in response to telephone calls from local residents who wish to contribute.

Proceeds from sale of the re-conditioned articles in Salvation Army Thrift Stores are used to feed, clothe and house hundreds of men who call upon the center for aid.

Castoffs contributed in 1955 enabled the center to provide 270,110 hours of occupational therapy, 60,235 meals and 20,300 lodgings. In addition, \$185,282.56 was paid in salaries and cash grants to employees and client workers.

Brigadier William J. Parkins, manager of the center, said the social rehabilitation program re-
