Dandoy Confirms Canada Grid Deal

Torrance's Aramis Dandoy, generally considered one of the greatest all-around backs in the University of Southern California's football history, will be strutting his stuff for the Calgary Stampede of Canada's Western Interprovincial Union next season, it was learned here Saturday.

Dandoy was a football and basketball great at Torrance High. He was graduated in 1951.

Dandoy, who starred for the Trojans from 1952 through the 1955 Rose Bowl game with Ohio State, came to an agreement with Bob Masterson, general manager of the Stampede, via the long distance telephone Friday night.

He reportedly will receive \$10,000 per season plus a \$1000 bonus for signing.

Confirms Deal

The former sensational Southern Cal triple threat back, who had been sought by three other Canadian teams, confirmed his deal with the Stampede. "I spoke with Masterson over the telephone and we have come to an agreement on everything. Sha, I'm now awaiting the arrival of dent Baker contract to make things of son, 1955 pl.," said Dandoy from his Mrs. Baker in Lomita.

fort last Dandoy, who stands 5 ft. 11 inches and weighs 185 pounds. Dandoy rated an outstanding prospect. He was one of the Cleveland Browns' top draft choices last year, but was dropped from their roster after sustaining an injury three days before the opening of the NFL season.

In all of the Browns' 1955 exhibition games, Dandoy's work stood out. Against the Green Bay Packers and the Chicago Bears he played practically the

entire game. His release came as a complete surprise.

The 23-year-old Dandoy twice starred in the Rose Bowl, the first time against Wisconsin in 1953 and against Ohio State two years later. His 86-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Ohio State contest is a Rose Bowl record.

Against Wisconsin, which the Trojans won, 7-0, Dandoy carried the ball 12 times for a 10-

yard average and completed four out of four passes. In addition he played a bang-up defensive game.

Top Kicker
Noted for his quick kicking ability during his career at SC, which continually kept the Trojans' foes in the hole, he was a consistent 40 to 45 yard booter during his four years of college ball.

Dandoy's 91-yard run against Washington State in 1953 is the all-time SC longest run from

During the 1953 and '54 seasons, Dandoy led the whole SC backfield in every department both on offense and defense. In '53 he had a 5.7 average in carrying the pigskin and the following season he turned in a 5.4 mark.

Dandoy, whose father was born in France, graduated from Southern Cal with high scholastic honors in the business administration field. He is married and the father of two boys.

The ex-trojan great is a tremendous open field runner and his all-around ability should prove a valuable asset to the Stampede in their quest for Canadian western divisional honors.

County Parks and Recreation Superintendent N. S. Johnson said Mike Ralston and Ed Kantor, rated first and second in the state, will be leading contenders. Other top notch players will be Sharon Acton, Mary McIlwain, and Clemmie Ryan, all of whom hold state ratings. Ralston and Miss Acton are 15 years of age.

Adult players from as far away as San Diego and Santa Barbara will compete, along with junior players from county parks in 14 events in the Alondra Community Building, 3535 W. Redondo Beach Blvd.

Highlight of the tournament will be the championship singles and doubles, which will be played Saturday evening, April 28.

7th Annual Optimist Relays Slated For Elementary-Aged Tracksters

The seventh annual Optimist Club-sponsored Grammar School Relays will be held on the Torrance High School oval May 5, it was announced here Saturday by George A. Bradford, president of the sponsoring club.

Competition from all Torrance schools is being selected between now and the date of the meet by intra-school meets, Bradford said.

Heading up the list of meet organizers is Coach Cliff Graybehl, charter member of the Torrance Optimist Club and varsity football coach at North High School.

Eight events have been scheduled for the May 5 meeting, according to Graybehl. Those events are designed for boys of the age and weight of elementary school students. Events include the 70-yard hurdles, 100-yard dash, 180-yard dash, 440-yard run, football throw, broad jump, high jump, and shot-put.

After Records
The 1956 competitors will be shooting for some new records, but they'll have their work cut out for them, Graybehl warns.

Dick Bentwood's 1953 record in the 180-yard dash of 21.9 has withstood two years of serious assaults as has the record of 63 seconds posted by Richard Ruffell in the 440 yard run in 1953. Ruffell went on to become one of Torrance High School's greatest athletes this year when he broke all high school scoring records in basketball and was unanimous choice for all Bay League honors.
