Hahn Quizzes Quinn on Increases

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn last week protested the announcement by County Assessor John Quinn that assessed valuations on residential properties are to be increased as much as 30 per cent.

Noting that press reports in papers of that area quoted Quinn as stating that new subdivisions in Gardena, Torrance and Redondo Beach will get the sharpest increases, Supervisor Hahn declared "it seems to me to be unfair to put the burden of the increase in property assessed valuation on the small home owner."

Supervisor Hahn contended that many large industrial properties are being sold for much higher amounts than has been reflected by their assessed valuations.

"I have also heard that there are many large speculative industrial developments that have not been assessed at their true worth," Supervisor Hahn stated in a memorandum to Quinn.

Calling for Quinn to "clarify" the situation so that "the small home owner will not be singled out for all the tax increases," Supervisor Hahn invited him to appear before the next meeting of the county board of supervisors.
