

## Employment Manager Given Pin for 25 Years Service

California Department of Employment recognized a quarter of a century of service by Winona L. Ellis, manager of the local office of the Department, and nine other employees of the agency, with the presentation of 25 year service awards at the closing session of the annual management conference of the Department in Sacramento recently.

A citation and service pin was presented Mrs. Ellis by H. W. Stewart, director of employment, and W. A. Hicks, deputy

director. Mrs. Ellis began her career with the state in 1930 as a stenographer in the San Francisco office of the Civil Service Commission. In 1937 she was advanced to administration branch of the California employment security program as an interviewer with the Department of Employment in San Francisco. She was named manager of the Fresno Local Office of the Department in 1938 and came to Torrance as manager in July 1947.

Solos on the French horn are rarely heard and this concerto so seldom played that the only copy of the score in the United States had to be sent to the Civic Symphony from the east.

**Ballet Schedules**  
Ballet performances for the Saturday program include such favorites as "Sylphides," "Swan Lake," and the "Bluebird."

More than 100 young dancers will appear in the ballets and 55 musicians will play in the orchestra.

## City Attorney Rules Drale Voting Proper

Councilman Nicholas O. Drale's actions in abstaining from voting on tract maps where he earlier acted as broker in sale of the land was entirely proper, according to a tentative opinion announced here Saturday by City Attorney James M. Hall.

"The matter before the Council does not involve a contract to expand or receive money," Hall said. "The Council is acting in an administrative capacity in reviewing tract maps, he pointed out."

### Deputies Hunt Caps

Dynamite caps, stolen recently in the burglary of the Chandler Sand and Gravel Co. of Lomita, continue to turn up in that area, with deputies intensifying their search in hopes of recovering all the caps before someone is injured.

About 200 caps were taken in the burglary. Only about 30 of that total have been recovered.

Authorities said the caps can be exploded by applying pressure or by putting them near heat.

Deputies reported another instance of the caps turning up Friday when an 8-year-old Lomita girl wandered home with one in her mouth. Her father reported finding the cap.

A 36-year-old Torrance tractor salesman, George Golovin, of 1017 S. Lemon St., Anaheim, died in Harbor General Hospital Thursday from injuries suffered in a traffic crash at Figueroa and Carson Sts.

A pick-up truck driven by Golovin and a car with Normal L. Clouch, 46, of 1815 Bailey Dr., at the wheel, were involved in the collision. Highway patrolmen said the two vehicles crashed at the intersection and Golovin's truck continued on across the street and hit a gas pump in a service station.

### South High School

Site grading for the new South High School, to be located on Pacific Coast Hwy. just east of Calle Mayor, will begin today, and construction of the first building should be started late this summer, school officials have announced.

Architect sketches of the new South High School, which is scheduled to open to about 1500 9th and 10th graders in September, 1957, reveal an imaginative planning which should result in South High being one of the most efficient and well designed high schools in the Southland.

The trio finished second, third and fourth, but their demise sent Paul Chandler and Dave Campbell, both of North High, up to second and third place respectively. The top three in each event will go to the CIF prelims. Roy, of Beverly Hills, won the event in 1:59.3.
