Scout-A-Scope
 Scout-A-Scope ticket sales are now under way in the Harbor district of the Los Angeles Area Council for the Big Scout Show which will be held in the Coliseum on June 2, according to William Sells, Harbor District publicity chairman.
 A show is planned each year to provide a program for the 45,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Explorers in the area as well as to show the people of the community what the Boy Scouts are doing under the devoted leadership of the 16,500 volunteers who make up the Scouting family.
 Ten thousand boys of all ages are busy now constructing props, making costumes, learning Indian dances, and building small boats and tents for the various scenes which are divided into four acts: Frontierland, Adventureland, and Tomorrowland in honor of the general chairman of the event, Walt Disney.
 The four local act chairmen are: Frontierland, H. Bruce Banks of Wilmington; Fantasyland, Mrs. L. Paulette of San Pedro; Adventureland, G. H. Mansfield of Gardena; and Tomorrowland, Charlie Reintoma, of Torrance.
 Wagons will roll onto the floor of the Coliseum. Indians will wage war after savage dances before being chased away by the U. S. Cavalry under the leadership of a well known historic figure and a song by Fess Parker (Davy Crockett).
 The history of Scouting will be emphasized in the scene from Adventureland as Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scout movement, is portrayed as he starts training boys during the Boer War.
 World fellowship in Scouting will be shown as Scouts in the uniforms of many nations repeat the Scout Oath in the languages of their countries.
 Little brothers of the Boy Scouts, Cubs, will star in the Fantasyland act with Cub Scout themes, wearing costumes of knights of old, circus clowns, Indians, cowboys... all colorful costumes that are limited only by the imagination of the young Scouts who are between 8 and 11 years old.
 Peter Pan will make his appearance, with a great pirate ship sailing over the green surrounded by small boats manned by Cubs who are now industriously fabricating them in garages and back yards in the forty odd communities that make up the Council.
 Finally Tomorrowland... as Scouting takes its place... and responsibility in the world of tomorrow, Onward for God and Country.
 Such a show gives the people of the Los Angeles area an evening of family entertainment as well as the opportunity to support Scouting for boys in their neighborhood.
 Year around program opportunities, field service, training and facilities for Scouts their leaders, units and sponsoring institutions are also provided.
 Tickets are sold for one dollar each, and of this amount, 20 cents goes to the unit that sells the ticket, and in addition a bonus of 10 cents is given if the ticket is sold and the money turned in by May 21.

 After the boys were told of the habits of birds, looked at pictures and had looked at a meadowlark through binoculars while listening to its song, they were taken on a bird walk through the park. sighted on the hike were a mockingbird's nest, a baby sparrow, and two turtle doves' nests. The careless method of nest building by doves was compared to the hummingbirds nest building which consists of saliva and spider webs. Other birds sighted were towhee, blackbird, grosbeaks, finch, linnet, wren, and many others.
 May 5 was the day set for bird count as more birds are supposed to be migrating at that time. Mr. Windle stated that they have 60 varieties listed that have been on their place this spring.

So. Cal. Needs Water, Northern Area Has Plenty

 More than 78 per cent of California's water originates in a few northern counties, while 77 per cent of the present water requirement is in the South.
 Starting from this basic situation the State Water Resources Board has now completed a master plan for the distribution of California's water supply which has been in preparation since 1947.
 The supply itself is ample for all foreseeable needs, according to the Board's report, but its proper distribution will require some 700 miles of coordinated waterway extending from Oregon to the Mexican border.
 This would involve the ultimate construction of 270 major new reservoirs, with a total storage capacity of 60,000,000 acre feet. The largest storage basin now in use is Shasta Dam, with a capacity of 4,500,000 acre feet.
 "Cost Unprecedented"
 The total cost of the project, which is described as being unprecedented scope and magnitude, is estimated at \$11,000,000,000, although some of the developments envisioned in the over-all plan may not be needed for more than 100 years.
 The project's waterway would carry some 21,500,000 acre feet of water from the areas of origin in the north to the areas of deficiency in the Central Valley and the southernmost portions of the state.
 Amendment Needed
 As to the basic imbalance between these areas of origin and need, the Water Resources Board recommends that this be settled by a Constitutional amendment to be passed upon by the voters.
 Such an amendment, however, must be worked out in terms that will be satisfactory to both areas, and the responsibility for this task falls upon the Legislature. Between now and the 1957 Regular Session two sub-committees of the Joint Interim Committee on Water Problems will be working on this phase of the project.
 A 10-member group of five members from each House will inquire into "matters involving provision of adequate water supplies for the counties in which member originates." A four-member group, of which one member will examine "the inter-deficiency problems of the South Coastal Area of Southern California."
 In the meantime the Water Resources Board believes that the solution of this problem should not prevent an early start on the over-all program.
