Time trials open at 7, racing at 8:30 p.m. for each of the 3 night shows, with the Sunday Jalopy Derby being green-flagged at 2:30 p.m. Saturday night's vehicles are souped-up "hard-tops" using 1937 to 1941 engines and bodies as compared to the brand new late model machines equipped with stock engines competing Sunday night.
