

Spring Vespers Set For Methodist's Services

"Jesu, Priceless Treasure," one of Bach's lesser-known sacred motets, will be the featured section of the Spring Choir Vespers presented in the First Methodist Church, 1551 El Prado, Sunday at 4:30 p.m. All three choirs of the church

will join in singing this choral work which Bach wrote in 1723. The music is based on an old chorale to which Bach added chorus sections with texts from the Epistle to the Romans, complementing each verse of the chorale. A trio and a quartet, composed of Eva Brundin, Barbara Hofferber, Alta Gans and L. H. Buff, will interpret certain sections.

The Intermediate Boys' and Girls' Choir will present a group of representative children's anthems, including a 14th century chorale and a setting of "Brother James Air." Charlotte McComas and Kathleen Taylor, members of the choir, will sing a duet, "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us."

Rachmaninoff's "Glory to God" and an interpretation of "The Prayer of St. Francis" will be among the selections to be sung by the Senior High-College Choir. Sally Bridgeman, Herman Cobrea, and Ed Hutchison will appear as soloists with this group. Rev. Don Shelby, minister of music, will also direct the combined choirs in Bach's "Jesu, Joyance of My Heart" to open the program and "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," by Shrubsole, which will close the vespers service. Ruth White will be at the organ. The church has extended an invitation to all who would like to share in this service.

Baby, Three Months Old, Dies in Lomita

A three-month-old Lomita girl was found dead in her bed by her parents early Sunday morning, sheriff's deputies have reported. The victim, Carol Ann Frey, lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ray Frey, in a trailer at 2301 Pacific Coast Hwy. Frey told deputies the family had moved to Lomita from Arkansas just a week ago. Exact cause of death was not determined, but authorities indicated the tiny girl may have suffocated.

Three Outstanding Students Picked to Attend Boys' State

Making preparations to spend a week in Sacramento as this area's representatives at the annual American Legion-sponsored Boys' State are three Torrance boys, Don L. Kelley, of Torrance High School; Ray A. Grieshaber, North High School, and Jack A. McNeil, who will represent Junipero Serra High School.

The three Torrance boys will meet with representatives of other schools throughout California in a legislative session, and will conduct a meeting much like the assemblymen and senators elected to represent the areas in Sacramento. Kelley and Grieshaber are being sponsored by the Best 8 Crossland Post 170 of the Legion, while McNeil is being sponsored by the Gardena Valley Legion Post No. 187.

Kelley, a junior at Torrance High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don A. Kelley of 1415 Beech Ave. He is junior class president, a Tartar Knight, Boys' League secretary, captain of the "B" track team, member of the scholarship society, and has taken an active part in all class activities at Torrance High. He is also active in the First Baptist Church where he is president of the Senior Hi group, member of the choir, and a cabinet officer of the Harbor Asan. McNeil is a junior at Junipero Serra High School, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas F. McNeil of 3313 Sonoma. He is secretary of the California Scholarship Federation, active in his school's athletic program, member of the advertising staff of the school's annual and the newspaper, and has been an active participant in youth activities at Nativity Catholic Church. Both McNeil and Kelley are top ranking Boy Scouts and each holds Eagle awards, top religious awards, and top Explorer awards — the Silver Award. Each have attended Pullmont (N.M.) Junior Training Course for top junior Scout leaders. Grieshaber is a junior at North High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Builder Asks Franklin Aid
