Wallace Pitches, Homers Bruins To 11-1 Victory Over Indians

Three-hit pitching and bases loaded home run, both coming from Robert Wallace, gave the Bruins a big 11-1 win over the previously undefeated Indians in North Torrance Little League play Friday.

The Bruins were aided in their assault on the league leaders with a double from Beck, and two runs in four times at bat from Donald Fieps.

Earlier in the week the Bruins outgassed the Trojans 9-7 on another bases loaded homer, this time by Skip Mooney, and two hits, one a double, in four trips to the plate by Jesse Fadic.

Trojans' scoring came on a combination of three hits and five Bruin errors, with Randy Mack, Welch, and Williams providing the losers with action at the plate.

The Bruin wins put them solidly in second place in North Torrance standings, as they trail the Indians by one and one half games which might well be termed "crucial."
