

TROJANS BEAT BRUINS 12-6

WELCH, TULLEY DOUBLE IN WIN

Doubles by shortstop Dennis Welch and third sacker Brian Tulley gave the North Torrance Little League Trojans more than enough scoring punch as they pounded out a 12-6 decision over the Bruins recently.

The win moved the Trojans into a challenging position for the runner-up spot in the N.T.L.L. standings, as both clubs trail the leading Indians by several games.

Mack, Colwell Star
Second baseman Randy Mack had a good day at the plate with three safeties and one run in four times at bat. A perfect hitting mark went to the Trojan's Gerald Colwell with two hits and two runs in as many trips to the plate.

Colwell also went the route for the winners on the mound as he limited Bruin batters to eight hits over the distance.

Trojans Behind
The Trojans were forced to come from behind once, and had to break a tie once for the win as the Bruins jumped into a quick two run lead in the first inning. Trojans went ahead 4-2 in the second and added two more for a 6-2 count in the top half of the fifth.

A Bruin rally paid off with four runs in the bottom of the fifth to knot the count at six all, when the Trojan slugger teed off on losing pitcher Jonathan Beck for six runs and the win in the final frame.

Top hitting honors for the Bruins were shared by Bill Cunery, with a double in two attempts at the plate, and Jesse Fadick with twin safeties in four trips.

Tribe Wins 12-3
On Friday the Indians kept on top of the league standings with a 12-3 win over the cellar-dwelling Bears.

Nick Hanlon pitched the win for the Tribe with a four hit performance, while Joe Castoreno had a perfect day, not with two for two and two runs, both hits going for two bases.

The Indians took the lead at the start and scored in every inning, except the second for their eighth win of the season.

Bear batting was led by Jon Baker with two hits and a run in two at bats, while Sam Cordova powdered one of Hanlon's offerings for a double.

Local sports fans will view exciting contests between the Army's Tom Courtney against Pittsburg's Arnie Sowell in the 800 meter run; Bobby Morrow of Abilene Christian meeting Rod Richards of the Army in the 200 meters; hurdlers Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College vs. the Navy's world champion, Jack Davis; Parry O'Brien, top man in the world, in the shot put against a host of 57 and 58 foot plus putters; and J. W. Mashburn, 1952 Olympic team member in the 400 meters, running against Lou Jones of the Army, the world record holder in this event.

Competition Tops
Caliber of competition is such, in the opinion of track and field authorities, that athletes who fail to finish one-two-three, thus not making the squad, could compose a team which could score heavily at Melbourne.

Meet officials are expecting a crowd of 50,000 enthusiasts over the two-day event.

Big Tourist Attractions Now Open

Historic Banning mansion, located at Banning Park in Wilmington, and the Cabrillo Beach Marine Museum, San Pedro, are top attractions for Southlanders and tourists. Superintendent of Recreation for the Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Dept., William Frederickson, Jr., reported recently.

Erected by General Phineas Banning in 1864, founder of Wilmington, the mansion was a center of Southern California social life for many years.

The Marine Museum has one of the finest collection of sea shells in existence and features on the second floor a Mariners exhibit which spotlights models of famous sailing ships, including the H.M.S. Bounty; navigation instruments ranging from the most primitive to today's intricate devices; and the logs of several old vessels.

Frederickson has announced that the Banning mansion is open Sundays from 1 to 4:30 p.m., while the Cabrillo Beach museum is open to the public daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
