

GOP Candidate Introduced At Kick-Off Rally

More than 2000 Los Angeles County Republicans met at the Statler Hotel Wednesday night for a campaign kick-off rally in behalf of Los Angeles County GOP Congressional and Assembly candidates.

Senator William F. Knowland represented Vice President Richard Nixon who had originally been scheduled to appear at the meeting as part of a Welcome Home tribute. Governor Goodwin J. Knight also highlighted the program. The Vice President was unable to attend because of the death of his father.

Senator Knowland announced that the National Republican campaign would be opened by the Vice President in Whittier Sept. 18 at a rally. He also called for an all-out campaign effort by Republicans at the precinct level to elect a complete team of Republican state and federal officers to support the Eisenhower-Nixon administration.

Other speakers were Republican County Precinct Chairman Walter Smith; Olympic star Mal Whitfield, who outlined activities for enlarging Republican Precinct organization in Los Angeles County; Leonard Jobe, who discussed the Republican Victory Squad; Howard Jarvis who detailed plans for the opening of GOP headquarters throughout Los Angeles County; and Alan Anderson who described the Register Republican Campaign to date.

Earl Adams appeared in behalf of Senator Thomas H. Kuchel and reported on the Republican state-wide campaign. Republican candidates for the Assembly and Congress were honored at the rally.
