The Southwest Schools Cooperative Special Education Program is a seven school district backed venture, which offers education for handicapped youngsters. Each district in the program has a special school for children suffering from a like physical handicap.

Classes are offered for the blind; for those with partial sight; those deaf and severely hard of hearing; for youngsters with orthopedic delicate handicaps and cerebral palsied youngsters.
