85th Congress Most Productive In History, Congressman Claims

The 84th Congress was the most productive in history, passing more bills than any other Congress, states Congressman Cecil R. King in his regular "Your Congressman Reports" mailed to the people of the 17th District.

In the eight-page report King nails the accomplishments of the session as "a constructive, substantial record of achievement."

King points to his major accomplishments in the 84th Congress as: enactment of Social Security amendments, lowering of eligibility age for

women, lower age for disability payments and increase in payments to the blind, disabled and aged; measures which strengthened enforcement of Federal narcotic laws; passage of his legislation referred to as the model workman's compensation bill; and numerous measures in behalf of the fishing industry, small business, veterans affairs, shipping, schools, harbors, natural resources, and postal and federal workers.

Legislation which he introduced calling for an across-the-board income tax reduction was not successful, King reported, due to the international situation and the determination to bring about a balanced budget.

TEAC Members Kick Off Fall Meetings Here

Torrance Educational Advisory Committee Members were briefed on the high school counseling program and presented with some key facts on the state loan and override tax election here Oct. 9 at the group's initial fall meeting Tuesday noon at the YWCA. High school vice principals Leonard Litton, Torrance High, and John A. Lucas, North High, outlined some aspects of the extensive district counseling program for the more than 100 members and guests on hand.

Annual Report. Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent, commented on the district's annual report, which is now going out to parents and on a pamphlet bringing forth the advantages of the override tax election. Both publications were recently completed by the district office.

Concerning the election, TUSD officials have announced that all voters will be notified of their precincts by individual postcard. Voters, who will be absent from their precinct on election day, may make application in writing to the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, 808 N. Spring St., Los Angeles 12, for absentee ballots.

Ballots Ready. Application must be made by Oct. 3 and include the following reasons for applying: 1. Reason for absence from polls. 2. Name and address of applicant. 3. Address to which the applicant wishes the ballot to be sent. 4. Signature of applicant. Torrance district officials are asking the state for a \$14 million loan and for authority to fix a maximum override tax of 75 cents on local citizens.
