## Sorority Chapter Pledges Volunteer Aid to Hospital

"Lamp of Learning" of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, chosen by members of the Eta Kappa chapter as the symbol on their pins, serves as the inspiration for their new undertaking to give their services to the Harbor General Hospital Volunteer Service. Learning to become better individuals and to contribute to the welfare of their community, Eta Kappa chapter becomes the first organization to pledge, as a group, its services to this project.

Service is the basic purpose of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, its leaders pointed out, and we realize that to survive we must in some way, great or small, serve others. To be prominent in a community the organization must offer a program that will benefit the community. With these ideals in mind each member has pledged at least four hours a week at the hospital.

In their duties at the hospital they will be representing the outside world in helping to break down any sense of confinement the patient may have. In this way, the community becomes concrete and loses its abstractness when they bring news of daily happenings and provide outside interests for the ambulatory patients. Through these services, the patient will not be a stranger when he returns to community living.

Experience as a Volunteer enables the individual to act as an interpreter of hospital activities to the citizens of the surrounding communities.

A few of the duties which the sorority members will be performing are answering the telephone, keeping desk drawers and compartments clean and orderly, receiving and directing visitors, performing clerical duties as requested by the nurses.

Other assignments will be the receiving and delivering of flowers, packages and mail to the wards; assembling new charts in the admitting room and preparing patients for meals, assisting with the distribution of trays, assisting or feeding helpless patients, and taking patients in wheel chairs to the sun porch; and obtaining and delivering equipment and supplies from central supply.

Under the program, each member is allowed to choose the best time for her assignment. This time must be adhered to closely in order to be of maximum usefulness to the hospital.

For easy identification, the sorority members have chosen a pink jumper type dress to be worn with a white blouse.
