

### Doctor Backs Bond Issue

Sam Levy, chairman of the Citizens Committee to pass the \$15,400,000 bond issue to replace vitally needed County Hospital facilities, yesterday announced the support of Dr. Ben Fries, past president of the Los Angeles County Medical Assn.

Dr. Fries, who is chairman of the Health and Welfare Committee of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, pointed out there is a critical need for hospital beds in Los Angeles County.

The bond issue is to construct replacement facilities of 700 beds at the Harbor General Hospital and is part of a long range program of the Board of Supervisors to provide better medical care.

It is the plan of the Supervisors, according to Chairman Burton W. Chace, to construct a County Hospital at four strategic sections of the County to provide nearby bed space to all areas of Los Angeles County.

per cent preferring the Democrats, 1495 or 29.4 choosing the Republican Party, 77 declining to state, 11 registering as Prohibitionists, and 12 naming miscellaneous parties. Lomita registration is up 962 since the June primary.

In the Palos Verdes Peninsula area, 4472 voters registered—2816 or 63.6 per cent as Republicans and 1539 or 34.1 per cent as Democrats. Prohibitionists claimed three, miscellaneous parties claimed 11, and 112 declined to pick a party.

The 68th Assembly District, now represented by Democrat Vincent Thomas, shows a continued wide edge for the Democrats.

The GOP has only 25,107 registered voters, compared with 62,872 who say they are Democrats. Prohibitionists number 69, miscellaneous parties 490, and 2254 declined to state.

GOP Has Edge  
In the 46th Assembly District, represented by Republican Charles Chapel, the Democrats had a slight edge—56,668 to 54,656.

The 17th Congressional District represented by Democrat Cecil King continued its Democratic predominance, with 177,959 Democrats and 107,338 Republicans. Registration in the district is 295,057, up 45,557 from the June figures.
