The auxiliary, which has been active since 1907, is beginning its 49th year of activity and during all those years these dedicated women have labored to help and improve the school at Chino. The boys have benefited in many ways, a new swimming pool, a new gymnasium, rebuilt cottages, and many other vital projects. The latest work to be undertaken is the establishment of a dental clinic at the school, which has been financially underwritten by the auxiliary.

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
