Brisbin, 25034 Walnut St., as the first president of Lomita Civic League, a non-profit organization.

L. E. Ross, 25022 Pennsylvania Ave., acting as temporary chairman, presented the constitution and by-laws for adoption and presided over the election of officers.

As a preamble to the adoption of the constitution and by-laws and election of officers, the following was stated as the purpose of the league:

"To preserve the rural residential character of Lomita; to prevent exploitation of homeowners by special interest groups; to work for improvement and extension of public service for the people; to oppose unwarranted creation of special assessment districts and unwarranted increase in taxation; to work for Lomita County Civic Center in Lomita."

Gas Company Employees Hit A-ID Mark

Tentative results show that Southern California Gas Co. employees in the southwest area registered a 94.8 per cent sign-up for the Associated In-Group Donors program of supporting health and welfare agencies, according to Division Manager C. W. Shupp.

Headed by a five-man labor-management committee, a concentrated five-day campaign was held to enroll employees of the company's southwest division in the one-donation plan of giving.

Final results of the campaign will be announced at an award-report meeting next month in Los Angeles.

The Associated In-Group Donors program, acting as an effective single campaign to support health and welfare agencies, sets up a standard contribution so that each enrolled employee gives at least 12 minutes pay per week to the plan. Contributions to AID are handled on a year-round payroll-deduction basis.

Through this plan, gas company employees support the Community Chest, Red Cross, Heart, Cancer, YMCA, Polio and other drives.

"The AID plan not only results in a great saving of time over conducting multiple drives throughout the year, but it also collects more money for charity," Shupp said.
